


Diane Abbott was born in London in 1953.

She then worked as a Race Relations Officer.




In 1980 Diane was hired by Thames Television.

She worked as a Press Officer for local government.




Diane's political career began in 1982.

The shadow government is an opposition government.




Diane has spoken out about important issues.

She opposed her government for her personal beliefs.




In 2010 Diane stood as leader of the Labour party.

In 2016 she became Shadow Home Secretary.




Diane is an experienced public speaker.

Diane is now the longest serving black MP.


She has been in parliament for 34 years.

She supports civil rights and women's rights.




