In 1824 Ira sailed to England for better prospects.




Britain had abolished the slave trade in 1807.

Ira was very popular with his audiences.




Ira became manager of Coventry Theatre in 1828.

Ira and Amanda had four children.




Ira first toured Europe in 1852.

Ira Aldridge died whilst in Poland in 1867.


He was honoured by important heads of state.

Ira's successes inspired African-Americans.


Theatres and acting troupes were named after him.




