Lilian became an orphan at the age of nine.

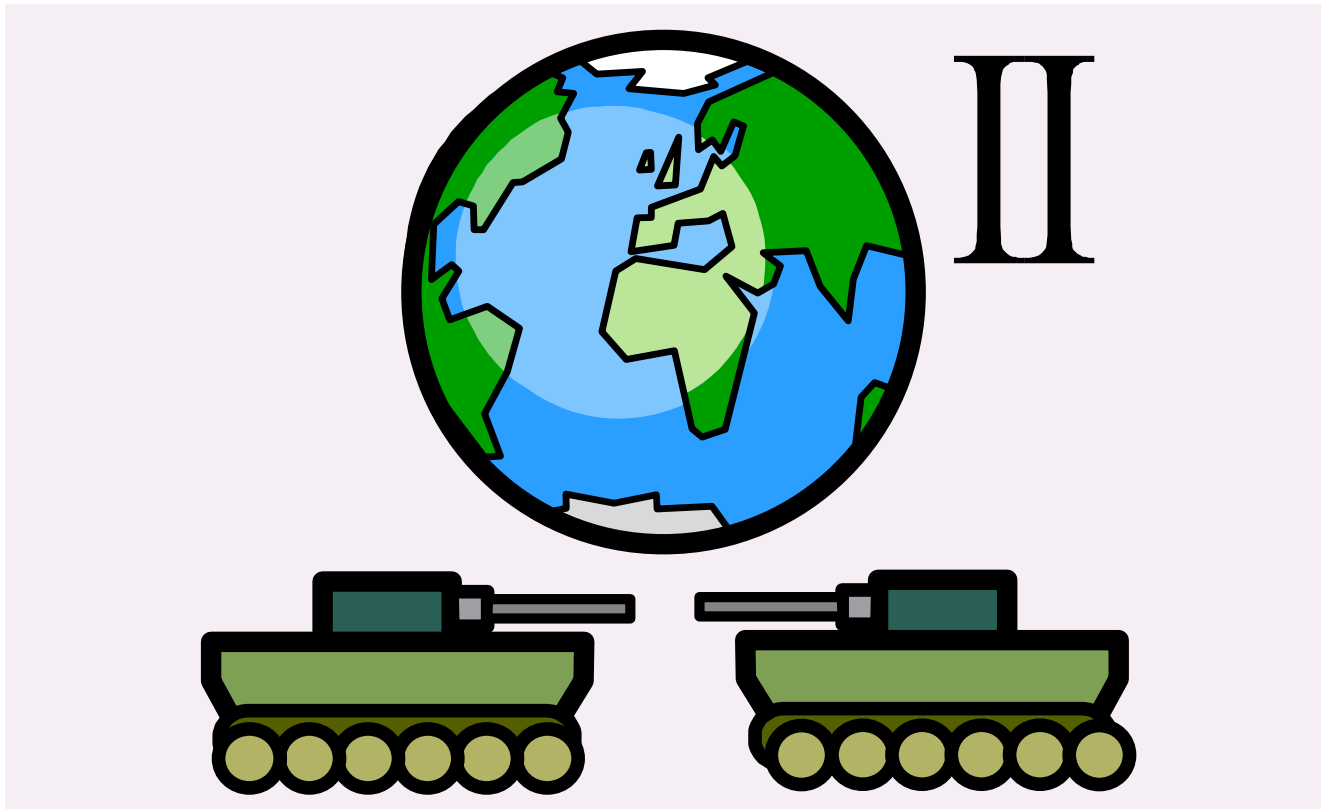


Lilian lived in a convent until she was 20.

People didn't want to employ her because of her race.

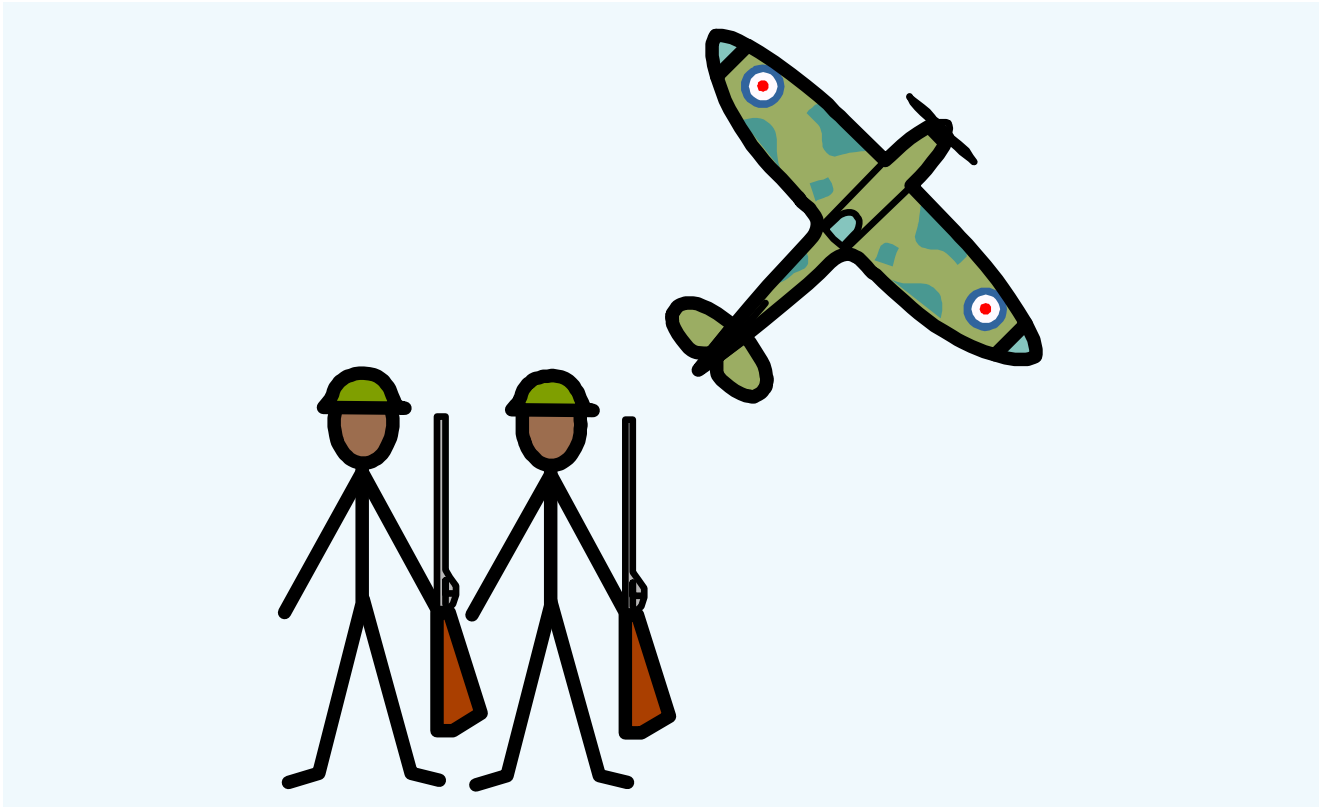


World War 2 began in 1939.

Lilian had to leave because her father wasn't British.

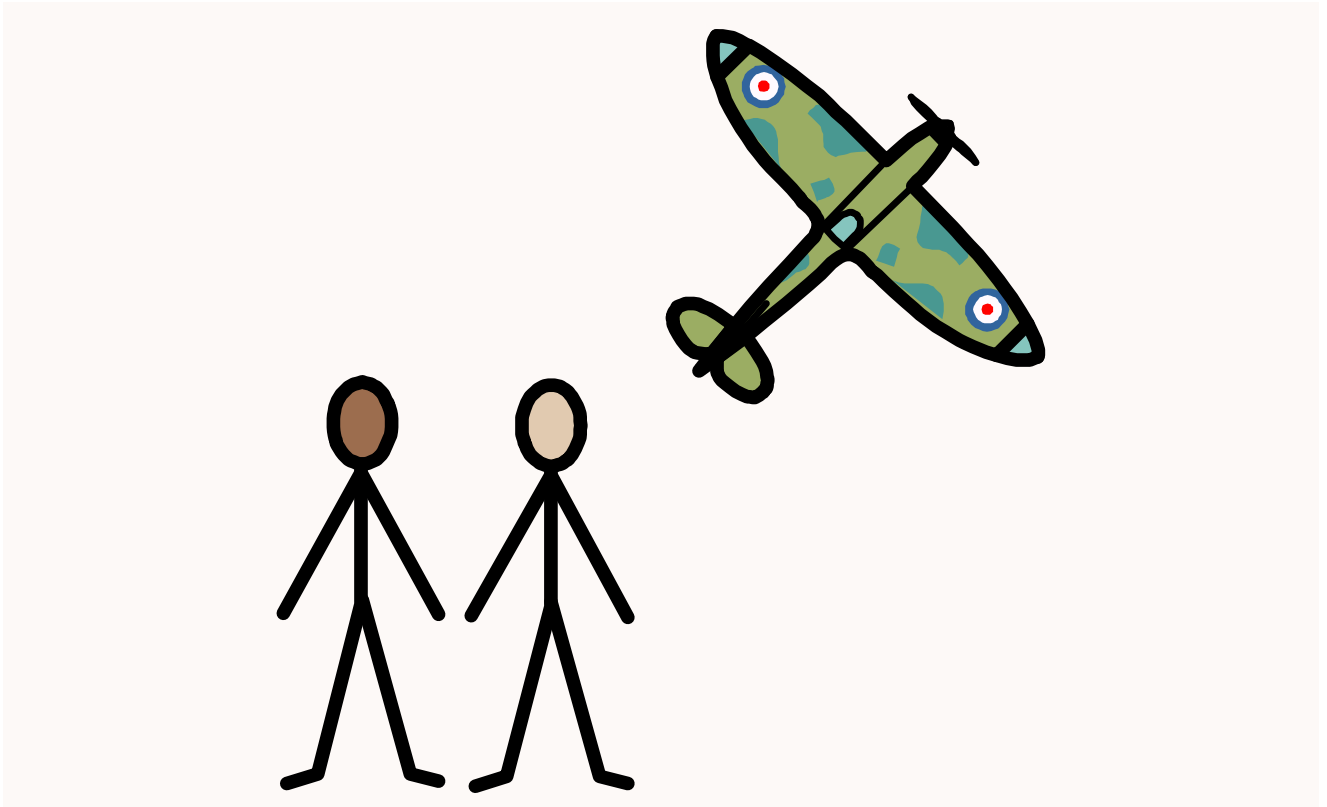


One day Lilian heard West Indian men on the radio.

But West Indian men could join the Royal Air Force.

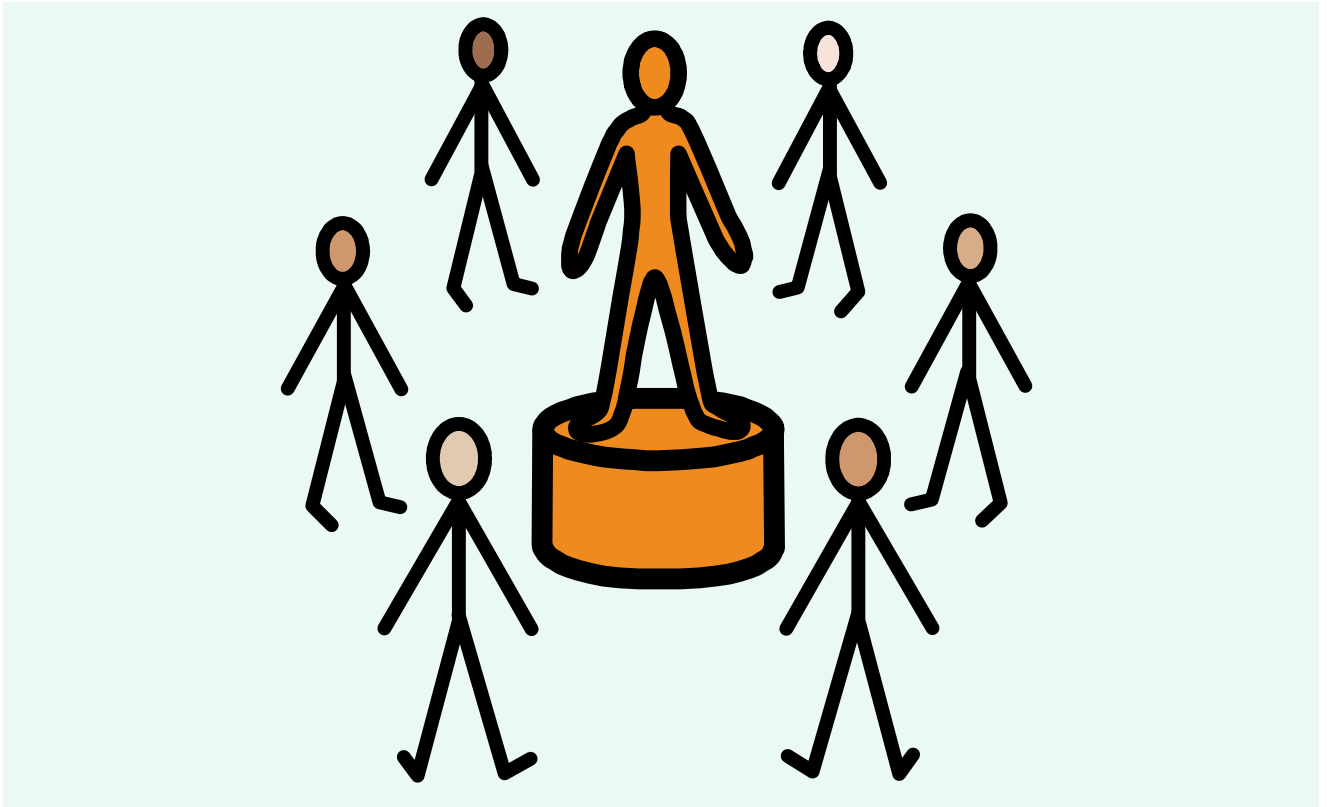


Lilian still wanted to help in the war.

She trained as a mechanic in the WAAF.

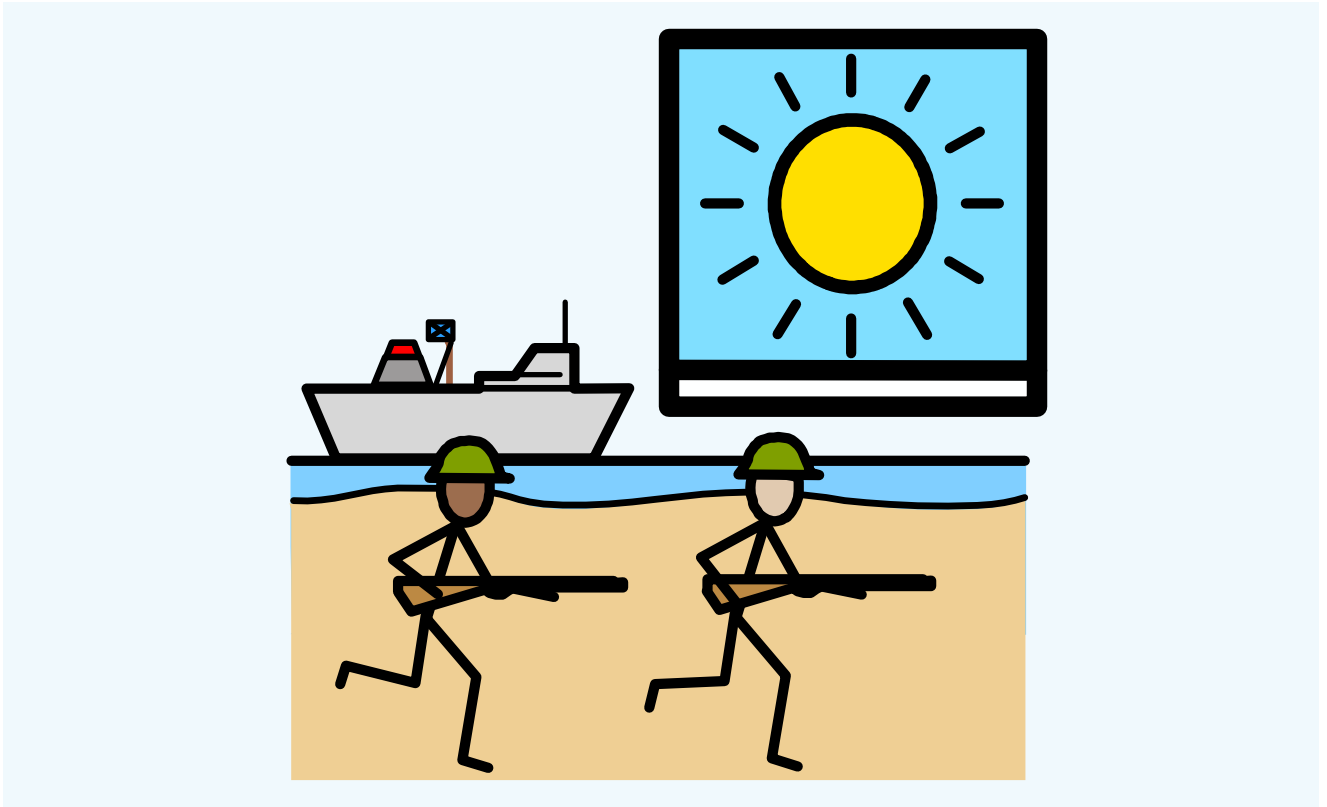


Lilian had faced discrimination in her life.

This meant she became the leader of a team.

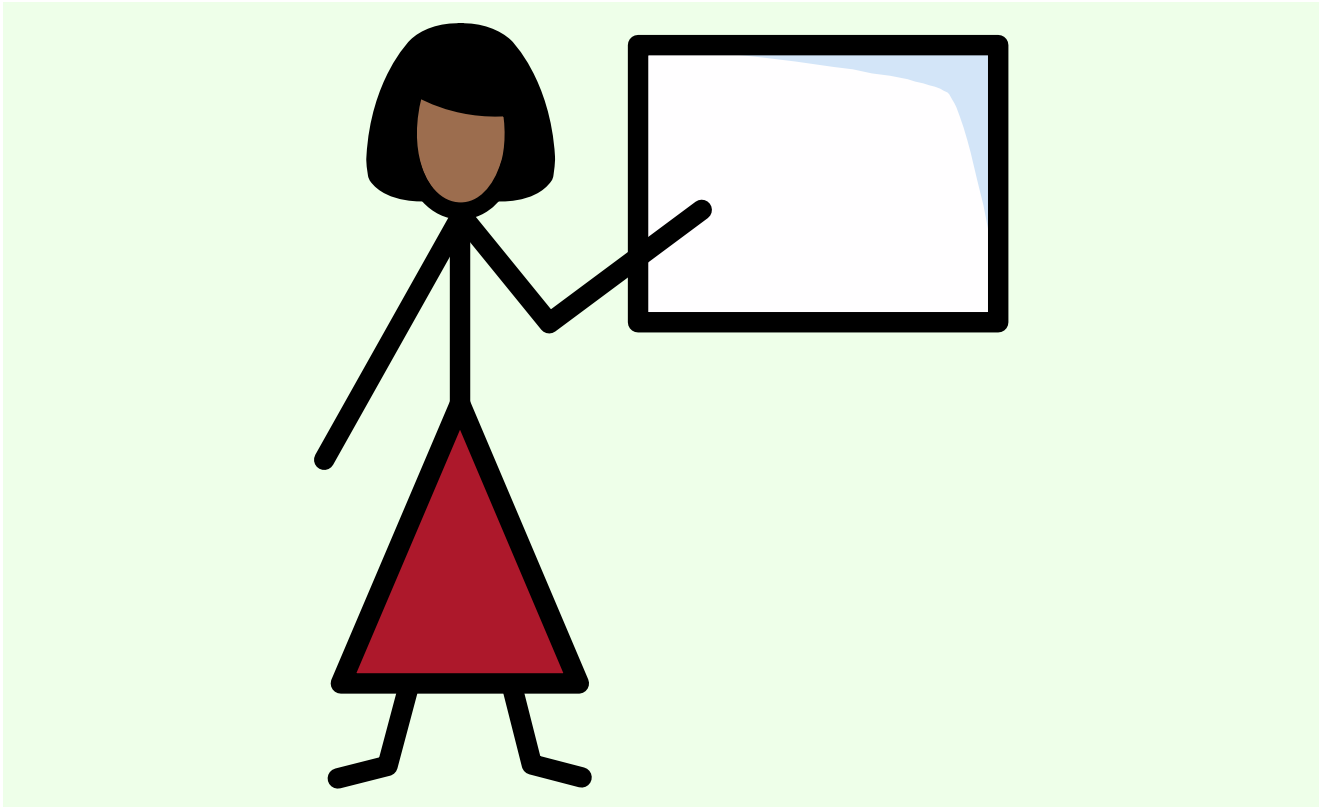


Lilian met a soldier called Ramsay Bader.

Lilian had to leave the WAAF.

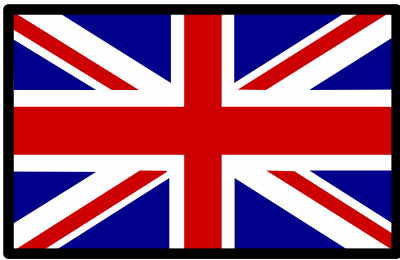
She studied to become a teacher instead.



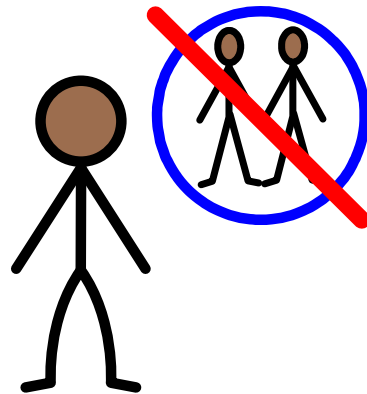
