

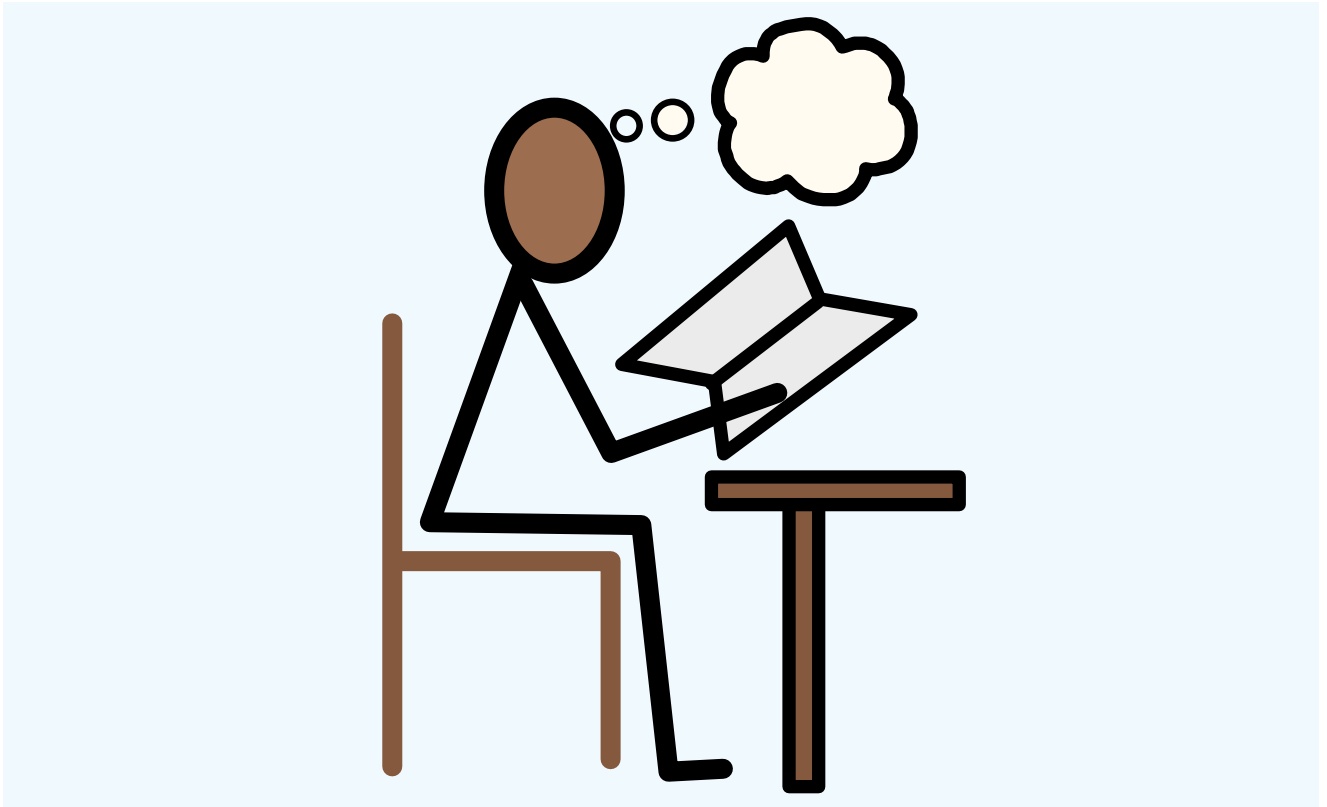


 was  born  in  1952.





In 1975 Olive enrolled at Manchester University.
